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letter from the CEO

As I reflect on our last fiscal year and our collective efforts to ensure youth and young adults face zero days of vulnerability, I am grateful to have this space to share some critical accomplishments.

Thanks to affordable housing capital funding from King County Department of Community and Human Services, Friends of Youth started the renovation and expansion of our New Ground Kirkland housing program. Further, support from A Regional Coalition for Housing (ARCH) and Washington State Department of Commerce towards the project, will ensure the agency can provide affordable housing to unhoused young adults.

Last year we achieved our two-year planning vision of identifying and acquiring a site to serve as Friends of Youth's new Emergency Overnight Shelter and Day services program in Kirkland. As the only overnight emergency shelter for young adults on the Eastside, this was a fulfillment of a key step in meeting the current needs of unsheltered young adults, while ensuring appropriate services were available to clients seeking them.

The acquisition and renovation of the site will significantly expand our agency's capacity to provide:

- 35 beds
- a safe place to stay
- quality meals with new commercial kitchen
- · commercial laundry amenities
- · dedicated health area

All with caring employees to assist our young adults in a dignified way.

The new Emergency Overnight Shelter was made possible by you, our partners, and the extraordinary advocacy of State Representative Lisa Callan 5th District, who advocated for financial support from Washington State to help make this dream possible.

Last year our Homeless Youth Services Division **re-started our street outreach work** that was suspended during the COVID-19 pandemic. Thanks to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services office of Runaway and Homeless Youth, the resumption of outreach efforts will help connect youth facing vulnerable circumstances to the services and resources they need.

This fall our goal is to celebrate the **ribbon-cutting of the Willows Youth Services Center**, and the first-of-a-kind for Friends of Youth; **15 units of young adult affordable housing, named Iva Place Kirkland, in the Summer of 2024.** We recognize that our work in supporting youth and young adults in a trauma-informed and dignified way requires a deeper youth focus, further program strengthening, and continued community support.

I would like to express my deep gratitude to each of you for your generosity. Your partnership impacts each of our clients, our community, and our agency. Your generosity, friendship, and advocacy contributed to our success this past year. You help make Friends of Youth a special community of support for our region.

Weiss' Story

Weiss Andrews grew up as a foster youth in Missouri. After experiencing hardships, Weiss became homeless. As a young adult with determination, dreams, and \$500 in his pocket, he bought a one-way Greyhound ticket from Missouri to Seattle.

Three days later, he arrived in Washington and began searching for organizations that could help him live a life of his own creation. Weiss researched and asked Seattle community members for homelessness and housing resources. That's when he heard about Friends of Youth and a place called The Landing.

Hopping back on the bus, Weiss made his way to The Landing in Redmond. It was here that his transformative journey with Friends of Youth began.

Friends of Youth Homeless Youth Services supported 425 youths this past year.

At the Drop In, Landing, Employment, Housing Navigator, MHRS, & CSEC.

Weiss quickly began planting roots at The Landing, where unhoused youth can find access to transitional beds, substance use counseling, and other harm reduction strategies.

On average, 12 young adults seek support at The Landing every day.

He asked himself "What am I supposed to do now? How am I supposed to live?" He tried various jobs but because of stress from PTSD, he had trouble finding the perfect fit.

During his time spent with the Friends of Youth services, he formed connections with employees who got to know him and offered services tailored to his needs. These employees would soon become some of his greatest mentors and advocates.

Through his therapist at Friends of Youth, Weiss was able to land an advocacy job working with youth in the foster care system. Not only could he tap into his past experiences, but he also found fulfillment and an opportunity to gain personal and professional growth.

"I really want to help people.
Knowing that I come from a place
where I understand exactly what
that system and those things do

many mentors that I've had."

Today, Weiss continues to work with youth in the foster care system. He is a dedicated advocate for the homeless community and wants to educate others about the stigmas surrounding homelessness, the reality of the foster care system, and the obstacles people face when seeking housing assistance. With his own determination and the support of Friends of Youth services, Weiss was able to secure a Social Security card, birth certificate, independent living, meaningful employment, and a fresh start.

areas of impact

homeless youth services

willows youth services center (formerly known as the Landing)

We provide crisis intervention, counseling, case management, and other supportive services for young people experiencing homelessness in East and North King County. Additionally, we operate the only young adult overnight emergency shelter on the Eastside, providing safe temporary living alternatives for young people experiencing homelessness or dealing with a crisis.

transitional housing

We have multiple sites located in King County offering safe housing, case management, counseling, and life skills for young adults and young families.

supportive housing

We provide subsidized apartments and case management for young adults ready for more independent housing.

rapid re-housing

We help young people and families experiencing homelessness locate and successfully transition to permanent housing.

housing & navigation support

We connect young adults with needed resources to help them permanently exit homelessness. Housing Navigators assist young people with accessing documents required by housing program services, such as state identification, Social Security cards, pay stubs, and disability verification.

exited from housing navigators to permanent housing in 2023

Additionally, Housing Navigators collaborate with Friends of Youth housing program services, as well as providers across King County, for housing referrals and client advocacy. Our Youth Engagement Team (YET) provides case management, housing navigation and counseling services to youth, ages 12 – 17, and families experiencing homelessness or at imminent risk of experiencing homelessness.

safe place & street outreach

We have a 24-hour crisis hotline and outreach services for youth 12 - 24.

Safe Place Coordinators respond in person to calls from youth 12 – 17, while youth 18 – 24 are referred to our Youth Services Center. Safe Place and Street Outreach collaborate to conduct outreach at local parks, schools, libraries, and teen centers connecting youth to shelters, case management, and other services.

youth & family services

healthy start parent support

We offer home visiting for pregnant and/or parenting families with children younger than age six. Home visitors provide a safe space and meet families where they are while providing basic supplies, parenting support and information, group activities, developmental and health screenings, and referrals to community resources.

behavioral health counseling

We provide counseling services and support for individuals between the ages of 4 – 24 with outpatient individual, family, and group counseling as well as prevention and intervention services. Through these services, we encourage individual and family goals, while recognizing the importance of traumainformed, culturally and linguistically responsive treatment. Our highly trained counselors help youth identify inherent strengths to help them achieve their goals.

residential and foster care services

residential treatment

We offer homes with specialized support for young people including treatment, behavioral health support, sexual behavior support, independent living skills, individual, group and family therapy, educational support, case management, family participation, and coordination of legal services.

youths were supported in the foster care program in 2023

long-term foster care

We work with children and youth, ages 6 – 17 (21 for Behavior Rehabilitation Services (BRS) with Washington State Department of Children, Youth and Families), in Long-Term Foster Care addressing the physical, emotional and social needs of children and youth in a supportive family setting. Foster parents are trained and supported to help children reach their therapeutic goals and prepare for adulthood. Unaccompanied minors can be referred by the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR), and other youth can be referred by BRS and DCYF.

residential group homes

Our program serves unaccompanied immigrant and refugee young adult males ages 12 – 21 with education support, life skills, employment skills, and housing.

national safe place week

Friends of Youth and National Safe Place Network teamed up in March 2023 to recognize National Safe Place Week. This week served to raise awareness about Safe Place, an early intervention and homelessness prevention program designed to support young people through any crisis.

National Safe Place is managed by 137 youth agencies. In King County, **Safe Place is locally run by Friends of Youth to quickly support runaway and homeless youth ages 12 – 17** by connecting them to services. Friends of Youth partners with various organizations, businesses, social service agencies, and other community partners who have volunteered to be designated Safe Place "sites," and local youth are provided with immediate safety and support through intervention, advocacy, and safety planning.

celebration of youth month

Celebration of Youth is Friends of Youth's largest annual fundraiser. This annual event has brought together nearly 800 community, civic and business leaders, and generous philanthropic donors for an afternoon of inspiration.

Together, in April 2023, **we raised over \$425,000** during our month-long Celebration of Youth fundraiser! Thank you to everyone who joined us in accomplishing our goals to support our youth and young adult partners and program services.

new willows youth services center

We are thrilled to share the new Willows Youth Services Center!

Representative Callan supported capital funds in the State budget to ensure we were able to purchase a property that is large enough to fulfill our goal to have day services and overnight shelter in one building. We also thank Kirkland Mayor Penny Sweet for her continued support.

Upon opening, Willows Youth Services Center will operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and expand available emergency shelter beds from 20 to 35. This services center will provide integrated behavioral health counseling, basic medical care, nutrition, and hygiene facilities. Young unsheltered people in our community will have access to the necessary health services, case management, and housing navigation services they need to transition to stable, longer-term housing.

National Charity League Sammamish Chapter





Over the past few years, our resilient employees, volunteers, and key supporters have worked towards strengthening our core diversity, equity, and inclusion values, despite the various challenges, changes, and collective "burnout". The Friends of Youth Willows Youth Services Center, the only emergency shelter for young adults, ages 18-24, in east King County, opened on Monday, January 22, 2024. The new facility is located at 12735 Willows Road NE, Kirkland, WA 98034.

It serves young adult clients, with both drop-in and overnight shelter services. Willows Youth Services Center and

Emergency shelter is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week — including holidays.

Willows Youth Services Center was designed in collaboration with young adult clients of Friends of Youth. Services include meals prepared in a commercial kitchen, enhanced laundry services, private sleeping areas, access to behavioral health counseling, housing navigation and employment support services.

Willows was made possible by the support of the community, including generous donations and grants from Microsoft, Amazon, the Washington State Department of Commerce, Friends of Youth Foundation, the U.S. House of Representatives Appropriation Committee, King County Housing Finance Program, Aven Foundation, Joshua P Williams Foundation and Meta.
